Housing conditions at Bankend in 1909

The following information was taken from

Coalburn Chronicle No 40.

BANKEND

One row of five blocks-20 houses-4 one apartment, rental, £5 4s.;16 two apartments, rental. £6 10s. Row of 3 houses of two apartments, rental, £7 3s.; row of 12 one apartment houses, rental, £5 4s,; 1 house of two apartments, row of 7 houses of two apartments, rental, £6 10s. The last row was reroofed seventeen years ago, and is in good repair.

These houses were erected at least eighty years ago--stone built--no damp-proof course--plastered on solid walls--wood ceilings--wood floors, not ventilated--some houses are damp. With the exception of four top houses, where felt has been placed below the slates a number of years ago, the roofs are not water-tight.

No gardens—wash-house for each house—coal cellars.

Pail privy for each house.

No sinks—surface channels.

Gravitation water supply, standpipe in front of the row.

Scavenged at owner's expense.

Ashpit in a broken down condition.

War time visitors to Coalburn

The recent BBC programme, "Return to Glasgow", told of the evacuation of children from Guernsey, one of the Channel Islands, to Glasgow and featured several of them returning to Scotland to recall their stay which lasted several years.

I thought it rather unusual at the time that Glasgow was their home, though it is likely that not all of them would be based in the city, indeed part of the programme focused on a young boy who died while here, in his case he was staying with folk in the Shotts area.

Knowing that there had been an influx of evacuees to Coalburn as well, while visiting the school I had a word with the janitor, Gilbert Dobbie, and he produced the school register for that period and I was able to get copies of part of the register.

The earliest child mentioned who came to the school was Francis Simpson, whose entry on the roll was 27th August 1940. The previous school was actually Waterside Primary School and the residence was given as High Whiteside. As the pupil's date of birth was 27th August 1927 he was obviously eligible for secondary school and the preferred option was Coalburn rather than Lesmahagow, of course it may have been the case there were no children in that situation at Coalburn, while Lesmahagow may well have had it's quota.

About two weeks later the school intake showed a further two newcomers to the village, Elizabeth McLean and Margaret McFarlane. Oddly enough the latter's previous school was shown as Coalburn P.S. and her address was shown as 184a, Coalburn Road. It was also shown that she left the school three weeks later and returned to Birmingham. However by January 1941 she was readmitted to the school and on this occasion her address is given as c/o Smith, 198, Coalburn Road.

She had come to Coalburn at that time from Edrington, near Birmingham and remained here until 19th June 1942. The other girl, Elizabeth McLean, whose home address was quoted as 143, Claythorn Street, Glasgow S.E., her former school being listed as St James'. She returned to Glasgow, in her case on 4th October 1940. Similar to the other girl mentioned, she too came back to Coalburn to continue her education from 20th March 1941. There is no record of when she left. While in the village she stayed with Mr and Mrs Danny Thomson, "Glenview" (Braehead Road).

By March 1941 the trickle of entries became a flood. Between 24th March 1941 and 17th November 1941 there were 204 entries on the register and of that number only 8 were not evacuees. No doubt the capacity of the school would be stretched as a result. To overcome this, quite a number were transferred to Bellfield School depending on where in the village they were billeted. In addition a good proportion of them did not stay very long at the school, whether through not being able to settle in a rural environment and returned to their homes.

Coalburn has always been seen as an understanding place to live and the acceptance of children of all faiths, particularly during those trying times was evident when the information is scanned. Though it can be ascertained without too much scrutiny the religious background of the newcomers, only on a single occasion has that been shown. In that particular case it was a young girl who had in brackets against her name (Jew). She lived in the village for seven months and a member of the family she stayed with is still resident at the same address.

Though the vast majority came from Glasgow, there were others from such as Whitley Bay, Binley, near Coventry, Paisley, Clydebank and Millport. As previously stated quite a number of the children remained in the area for a brief spell, but among those who managed to cope with the not insignificant change, several during their sojourn were selected to take part in the Gala Day which was kept alive despite the fact that the country was at war. At least that would add some lustre to the drabness of those far off days, and for our visitors the Gala Day may have given them an opportunity that might not have been afforded to them in the more populated parts of the country from which they had come.

For example in 1942 one of the Maids of Honour was Margaret Bole who initially came to the village from Polmadie, Glasgow on 22nd April 1941 and lived with Mr and Mrs John McLean at 30, Midfield Road and were registered at Coalburn Primary before transferring to Bellfield School on 2nd May 1941. In 1943 a brother and sister, Jean and Robert Wright were chosen while at Bellfield School, as a Maid of Honour and Page respectively. Originally they were staying in Garden Street before their move to another address which meant them going to the village's oldest school. Lawson Wilson who was based at 32, Midfield Road, with Mr and Mrs John Shaw also appeared, as a Page, in 1944. He had arrived in May 1942 from Johnstone and returned there in September two years later.

By 1945 there were still pupils being registered as evacuees at Coalburn, the last two noted were Pauline Wilson and Elizabeth Banker from Kentish Town in London and their date of enrolment was 17th January of that year and they were residing at 19, Garden Street at that time. Their return to London was shortly afterwards as the register shows them leaving on 12th February 1945.

It has to be recorded that not all evacuees were schoolchildren, whole families were "put up" in homes throughout Coalburn though sadly no further evidence is available to mark their feelings of that time of their life, nor what they felt they added to the community by their presence.

Though these registers are from Coalburn School, as can be seen from above, Bellfield School also had it's share of visitors. Unfortunately the registers of the school are not now available although we did have a caller at the Heritage Centre earlier this year who was on the roll at Bellfield School as an evacuee and was domiciled at Aikmanhill Farm with the Young family.

Coalburn must have had an influence on a couple of the girls who arrived here unknown as they later married two Coalburn lads.
