Netherton School

On Wednesday 2nd inst the annual examination of the school was made previous to the vacation. About 80 scholars were present who completely filled the school.

The examination was conducted by Mr Bond, the teacher assisted by the Rev. James Naismith, Douglas Water, and by the Rev. John Torrance, Glasgow. The various classes acquitted themselves in a very creditable manner, bearing gratifying evidence of the diligence and energy of their teacher.

At the close a large number of books of various sizes were distributed among the scholars as prizes. These had been very kindly provided by Messrs Brown, Auchlochan, Mrs Struthers, Crowhill and other generous friends, and were evidently highly appreciated by the children.

As there are at present over 100 scholars on the roll, it is felt that overcrowding is injurious to the health of teachers and scholars alike, and there is urgent need of enlargement of the premises.

It is hoped there will also be provided, if possible, a house for the teacher through whose efforts the school has reached its present prosperous condition.

Manchester City for a record fee

During the Second World War a number of evacuees came to the village and among them was a young boy from Renfrew who was admitted to the infant class in 1941. His name was Matt Gray and he was billeted opposite the school with the Shaw family, my grandparents.

His stay at Coalburn didn't last too long but his parents appreciated how well he had been looked after and over the next few years both families

made visits to the respective homes.

Matt's father, also Matt, was a avid football fan and he encouraged the youngster to take up the game and this he did when he played for Moorpark Amateurs, a local side in Renfrew. He was tall and made good use of his height and was a noted goalscorer, particularly with his head.

He soon had scouts from some of the Glasgow junior clubs interested and he eventually signed for Maryhill Juniors. As he continued to show skill and energy he was talked about at a higher level and he was signed by Third Lanark in September 1957 at the age of 21. While at Cathkin he became part of a free scoring forward, he averaged just over a goal every second game. 217 appearances and 120 goals.

He was chosen to play for the Scottish League team against a Scotland XI in the International Trial match in March 1959. Built like a traditional centre forward, he enjoyed the physical part of the game. He played in most of his games at inside forward for Thirds and he showed great skill wherever he played. His club mate with Third Lanark, Alex Harley joined Manchester City.

Matt had been thought about as a possible Rangers signing, which would have pleased his father. However Matt junior was keen to go to play south of the border as Harley and another former colleague, Davie Hilley had joined Newcastle United for a record fee of £31,000.

Manchester City came back to Glasgow for Matt and the Third Lanark management asked that the fee should be for £31,001 to create a new record and this was done.

He went to England with the reputation of being the best header of a ball in Scotland. He made his debut against Birmingham City and he enhanced his reputation with the winning goal with a trademark header from 30 yards.

While at Maine Road he also played at wing half and occasionally as a stand-in goalkeeper. In his 91 first team appearances he netted 21 goals.

He was released just before his 30th birthday in May 1966. The following year he went to play in South Africa and he remained there for four years.

Earlier this year he was presented, as a memento, with the framed cheque (£30,001) which had been on show in a pub in Glasgow which was owned by a famous former Thirds and Scotland player, Jimmy Mason. Matt is now back in his native Renfrewshire.

1 n 5 9 minutes Gray collected the ball from abounce-up and taking a step forward rifled the ball past Ronnie Simpson into the net.

A minute later Hilley slipped the ball to Gray who lobbed a perfect shot that curled neatly in just under the bar. And in 65 minutes it was Hilley the goal-maker again. McInnes this time put the final scoring touch to the move.

Ten minutes from the end Kinloch converted a penalty after McGillivray had pushed him in the box. Frankly it looked the only way Hibs would ever score.
